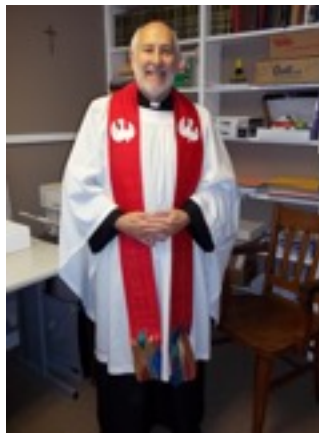

## *End of the Year Woes*

### *Granite Marker Makes Unscheduled Move*

Early in the week starting Dec. 13, the granite marker for St. Alban's near the corner of Church Street and Brookside Drive was knocked off its blocks, probably by a driver taking the corner at too high speed. The marker was not damaged luckily. Fr. John filed a police report and insurance claim, and Terry Fortson has kindly offered to replace the marker on its blocks for free; he will be paid \$100 for repainting it. ### *Heating?*

For several months, heating in the Sanctuary has been iffy—sometimes working, sometimes not. Repairmen from McGee came and thought they had it fixed, but the problem cropped up again on Friday Dec. 18 and a repair could not be scheduled until Tuesday Dec. 22, so Fr. John and Mary Randall decided that in view of low temperature forecasts the Sunday Dec. 20 service should be moved downstairs to the parish meeting room (the heat was still working there).

Members were notified, and a small number enjoyed the novelty of what Fr. John described as a throwback to the home services parishioners enjoyed before the construction of St. Alban's. (Right) Fr. ### *Lessons and Carols*

On Sunday December 6, St. Alban's Episcopal Church and the First Methodist Church of Elberton cooperated in presenting a Lessons and Carols service at the First Methodist Church. About 175 to 200 people attended and enjoyed the music and readings. Fr. John opened the service with a bidding prayer, and the Rev. Joe Watson, pastor of First Methodist, gave the benediction. Readers from St. Alban's were Fr. John, Nancy Seymour, Marilyn Slocumbe, Steve Jenkins, and Suzanne Moore. Andrea Martin sang with the First Methodist choir, which performed arrangements of carols by Joseph M. Martin. Brenda Cann was choir director and Angela Fleischer played the organ. A reception in the Fellowship Hall followed the service.

### *Rotary Coat Drive*

For the second year St. Alban's supported the Elberton Rotary Club's Christmas drive to provide coats to all the schoolchildren in Elbert County who need them. Fr. John reports that this year's coat drive was again successful in providing warm clothing for all those reported to be in need.

## Obituary: Mr. Henry Jaudon

Mr. Henry Scudder Jaudon, 81, passed away Sunday, December 20, 2014. He was born on November 23, 1934, in Elberton, Georgia, son of the late Mayson (Buck) and Betsy Grogan Jaudon.

Mr. Jaudon graduated from Elberton High School and Clemson University. After a tour of duty in the United States Army, Mr. Jaudon was a senior patent agent with the U.S. Patent Office in Washington, D.C. After a thirty-year career with the Patent Office, he was associated with the McNair Law Firm in Greenville, South Carolina.

Mr. Jaudon attended St. Alban's Episcopal Church, was a member of the Elbert County Fish & Game Club and the Elberton Elks Lodge, and was past president of the Elberton Country Club. He was an avid golfer and enjoyed playing Bridge.

In addition to his parents, Mr. Jaudon was preceded in death by his first wife, Patricia C. Jaudon, and his son, Henry Scudder (Buddy) Jaudon III.

Mr. Jaudon is survived by his wife, Anne Marie Dixon Jaudon of Elberton; his daughter, Debbie Jaudon, and her husband, Tom Michaud, and two grandchildren, Mayson and Camden Michaud, all of Atlanta. He also leaves behind a step-son, James M. (Jimmy) Barker III; two step-grandchildren, Miles and Addison Barker; and a brother, Starke (Brenda) Jaudon, all of Elberton.

A graveside service was held at Elmhurst Cemetery on Wednesday, December 23, 2015, at 1 p.m.; Fr. John Keeler officiated. Visitation and a Celebration of Life reception took place on Tuesday December 29, 2015, at the family residence from 2 to 4 p.m.
