better than we do now.

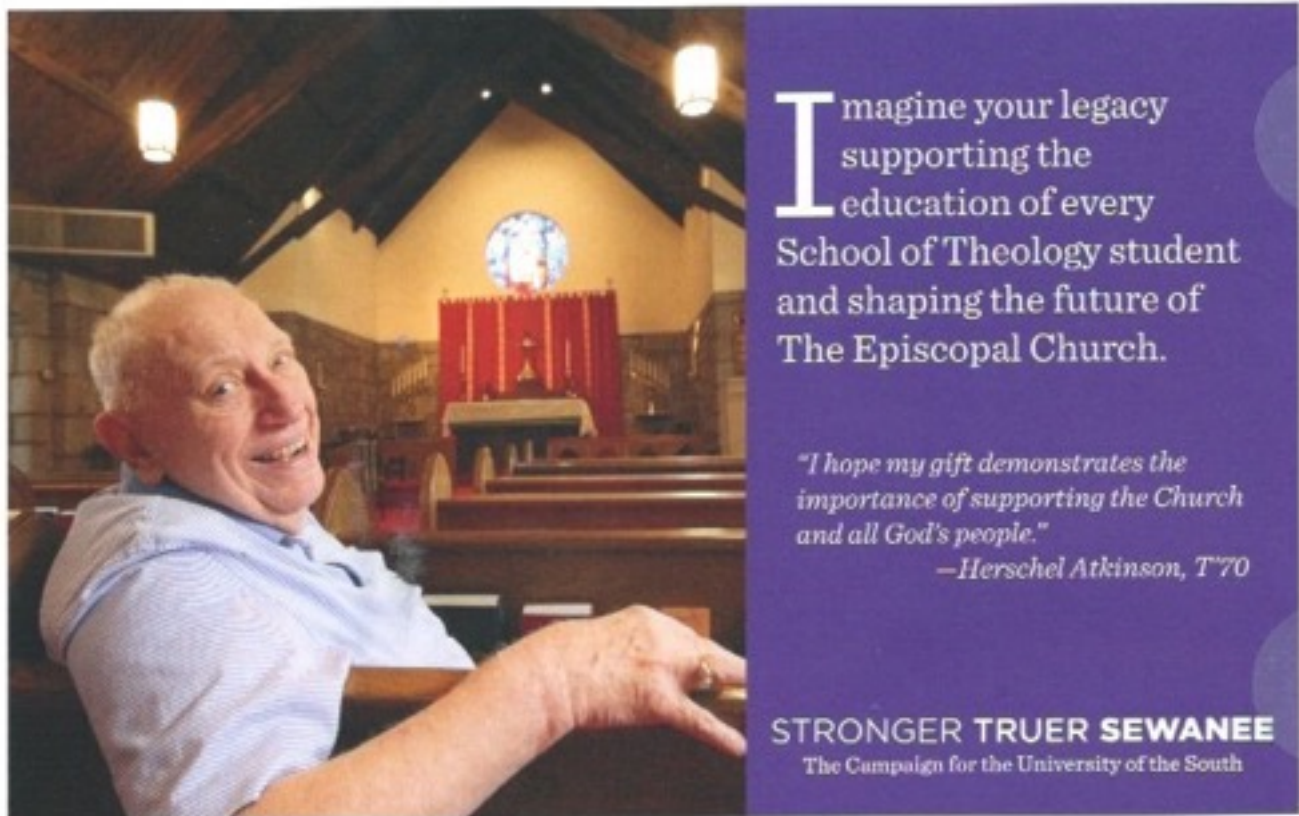

Is there a "we" we can be a part of if we move outside our walls and draw our circle wider?
