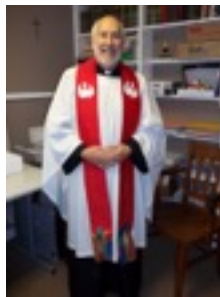

SafeHouse Update

Summer is quickly coming to an end. . . . At SafeHouse, we have several projects revolving around us. We are “processing” the excitement of a new office building; we are getting ready for our 21st annual Walk-a-Thon, and we are serving people nonstop.

We are very thankful for the donation of the Coca-Cola property that was given to SafeHouse. We still wish to move all of our current office operations to this facility by the fall. We have begun organizing the lists of things that need to be completed for us to utilize our new office space. We have not yet started physical labor inside the property. Before we can begin construction on the building, we have to secure the property. We have had quotes on fencing, and we are hoping to have the area secured very soon. Once the area is secured, we will need as many volunteers as possible to help with labor. We will need carpet removed, walls repaired from leaks and damage, shelves and partitions built, new doors and locks installed, and outdoor buildings cleaned out for storage. These are just a few of the areas where we will need help.

Most important, we are looking for a project manager who is skilled in repairs who would donate time to help us begin these projects. Once we have a project manager, we will be able to properly estimate the cost of repairs and begin writing grants for additional funding. This is a long list of “needs,” but we know that God is able. . . .

Although we are very busy preparing for our new facility, we cannot neglect that it is almost time for the 21st annual SafeHouse Walk-a-Thon. This fundraiser is a vital part of support for SafeHouse, and we are so excited to continue the walk this year. The walk will be on Saturday, November 5, 2016. We will begin our mail-out for this event in the next month. We hope to have a record year of support for the 21st Walk.

SafeHouse offers short-term emergency shelter to those in need. We are always taking in new clients and even making referrals when we are at full capacity. The summer season has been no different for us. We are busy servicing individuals for housing and also constantly refilling our food pantry. On average we service about 100 families per month with food. The food pantry is open to an individual or family in need. Hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 10 to 12 and 1 to 3. We love to help people in need. We love to be the hands and feet of Jesus.

From the Vestry Minutes of August 8

Fr. John presented the rector's report about his continuing activities at St. Alban's and in the community. In addition to ongoing activities, he is under consideration for an adjunct teaching job at Athens Tech, which will afford the opportunity to meet more young people. He stated he has not yet received approval from the diocese of the request to extend his contract beyond retirement in February 2017.

There were no wardens' reports.

Under new business, Robyn Keeler has asked to be relieved of the vestry secretary responsibility while she is functioning as treasurer. Louise Martin volunteered to take this on.

Under old business Fr. John stated delegates to annual council are needed. He will make the announcement to the congregation to see if anyone is interested. No vestry member has been able to commit to council so far.

Fr. John reiterated that Bishop Whitmore is available to meet with the vestry about church growth/revitalization. Steve Jenkins said a dinner at the country club or new hotel when it opens might be a good opportunity for the vestry to meet with Bishop Whitmore.

Possible ways to save money were discussed. (1) Use of high-quality artificial flowers has been suggested again; Fr. John said the vestry needs to talk to the congregation to see how people would feel about this change. (2) Robyn Keeler pointed out the high cost of insurance (workers comp and property & casualty) through The Church Insurance Company, and Fr. John stated he will find out whether Episcopal parishes are required to use this company for coverage. If not, the parish can look for less expensive coverage locally. (3) Fr. John pointed out that the parish will also save money when he reaches age 72 because no further contributions to the pension fund will be made.

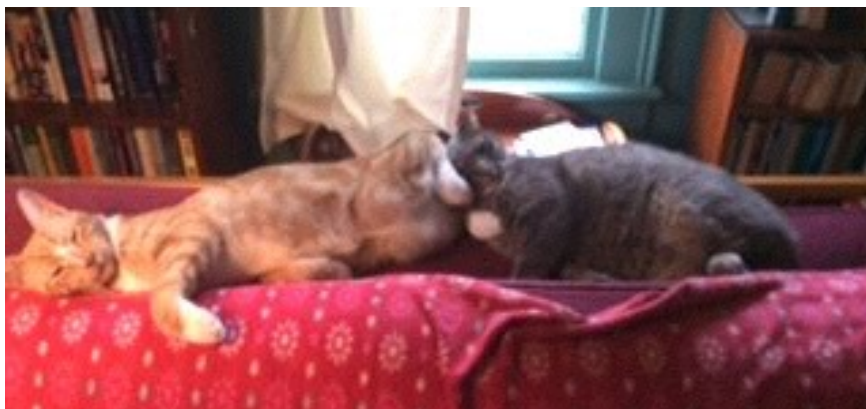
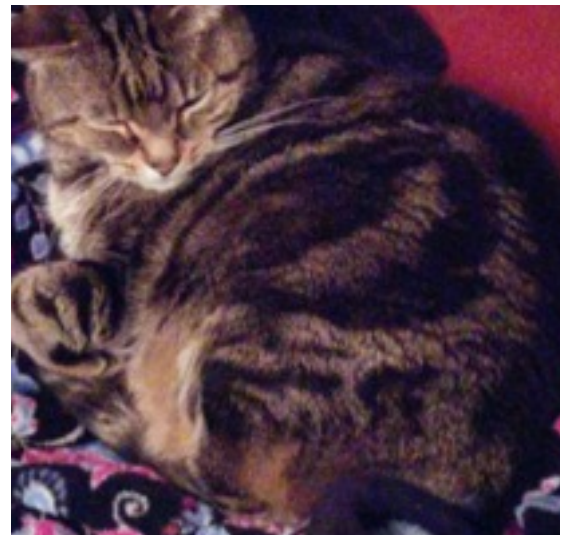
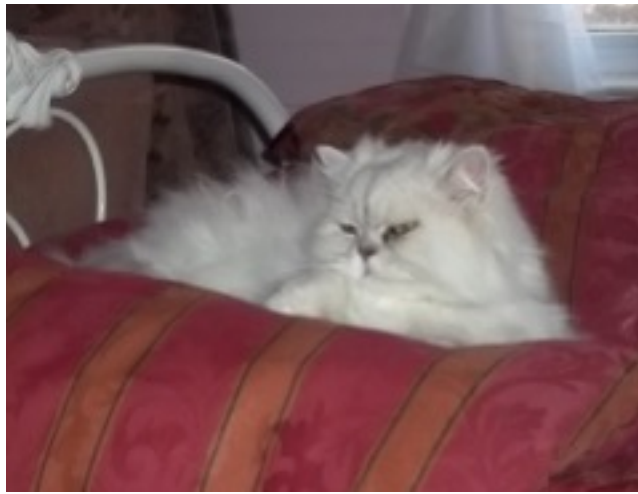
